One of my daily prayers is from the Sarum Primer, a collection of prayers developed in Salisbury Cathedral during the 13th century:

"God be in my head, and in my understanding.

God be in my eyes, and in my looking.

God be in my mouth, and in my speaking.

God be in my heart, and in my thinking.

God be at my end, and at my departing."

At its core, I believe this prayer speaks to how we perceive and connect with one another—how we comprehend, observe, communicate, and contemplate the strangers we encounter. KNIT NOTES

One of the most eagerly anticipated articles in the winter issue of The Knit Before Christmas is the annual *Christmas at Sea: By the Numbers* recap. The 2023 figures are impressive.

We packed a record number of ditty bags in Port Newark and shipped more knits and crochets to U.S. river mariners than ever before. We had an unprecedented number of volunteer groups express interest in packing. So much interest, in fact, that port packing extended into the third week in December. For the second year in a row, we had enough ditty bags (thank you, ditty bag makers!). After featuring ditty bags with cross stitch designs in 2022, the idea took off and we saw many more bags with nautical designs.

I had fun observing packing groups taking particular care in their selection of ditty bags, making sure the ditty bag matched the color of the hat, scarf, or cowl going inside. And, while thinking about color; I can't help but smile remembering U.S. Coast Guard members from Staten Island making Christmas cards from the construction paper and crayons I left out on our conference room table. It started a trend! The arts and crafts supplies became a permanent staple during the packing season and a new tradition has been born.

While numbers are important, they don't capture how beloved *Christmas at Sea* is. When the Santa Sacks appear, and the boxes are delivered during crew changes, the excitement is palpable. We continue

to hear echoes of stories reflecting how meaningful these gifts are to mariners far from home during the darkest, coldest, and loneliest month of the year. Not only do *Christmas at Sea* hand-knits and crochets warm heads and necks, but they also warm hearts.






Give Back Box (GBB) is a nonprofit organization that provides an affordable alternative when shipping your donations to *Christmas at Sea*.

For \$20 you can purchase a UPS shipping label. Simply go to givehackhox.com and click on the donate tab. Scroll down the page, click on "all charities," and you will see the SCI logo on page 3. Add the label to a virtual shopping cart and check out and pay with any major credit card. Download and print the label from the convenience of your home.

The maximum weight of the package is 70 pounds. The combined length and girth of the box may not exceed 108 inches. You will need a separate label if you are sending more than one box. There is no need to send anything priority or express, as we accept donations year-round!
